

Overview	Students will assess the information they know about the sixties, one of the most significant eras in American history. Once the students have a foundation of information, they will expand their knowledge by watching video clips of important events such as the Vietnam War and Civil Rights Movements, reading parts of a novel, and listening to a guest speaker.
Time needed for completion	5, 50 minute class periods
Objective	Students will be able to describe the Civil Rights Movement, the Vietnam War, and 60's pop culture.
Standards	Present a basic overview of the 60's including the Civil Rights Movement, important people that effected the 60's, the Vietnam War, and the major events that took place during this era.

Procedure	<p>Civil Rights Movement</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Important people -major demonstrations -Freedom Rides -MLK assassination and aftermath <p>Vietnam War</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -proxy wars -Domino Effect -roles that the Soviet Union and China played -Communism <p>Pop Culture</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Music artists -Public Demonstrations -Hippie Movement <p>YouPolls</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -each student will need to make an account by logging into the youpolls

	<p>homepage and signing up.</p> <p>-Students will then need to create a poll by using one of the topics listed below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - <i>Was the Vietnam war justifiable?</i> - <i>was the civil rights movement justifiable?</i> - <i>Did the music of the time effect the population?</i>
<p>Evaluation</p>	<p>Students will be required to debate on whether or not they think that all of the methods used in the Civil Rights Movements were necessary. They will also be able to debate whether or not the Vietnam War was justifiable, and how popular music of the time reflects the events of the time. Students will be required to write a short essay describing what they learned about the 60's and the major events that took place.</p>
