ENGLISH: TECHNIQUES OF GIVING A SUCCESSFUL SPEECH

Overview	The purpose of this activity is for students to learn the ways to deliver a successful public speech to a group of people, while finding their own mistakes by watching themselves on Justin.tv.
Objective	<p>Students will :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understand the aspects of a successful speech. • Know how to give a successful speech in front of a group of people. • Know the shortcomings of themselves and improve themselves.
Learning environment	Classroom
Materials	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Large screen • Computer with high speed internet connection • Speakers • Microphone • Webcam or video recording device
Procedure	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Ask the class to discuss about what they think is the main aspects of a successful speech. 2) Show them a video of Martin Luther King's "I Have A Dream" speech and ask them to pay attention to Dr.King's language, strength, confidence, use of tones and body gestures. 3) Ask the students to discuss about the aspects of a successful speech again, this time, try to relate it to the aspects they concluded from the video. 4) Tell them the aspects I concluded and ask them to compare it with theirs. 5) Ask them to prepare a short speech and do it in front of the whole class. 6) While giving the speech, use the camera to shoot them and make let them see themselves on the huge screen while they are delivering the speech. They could see what they did wrong and improve it immediately.
Application	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Students will give speeches in front of the class . • Students will be able to see themselves while giving the speech.

Evaluation

The students will write a short paragraph paper describing what they have learned in this class period and how did they improve their shortcomings.
